ingwood resident Kevin Carroll, 62, thought that continually being out of breath was "just the way my life was going to be" since he lost a lung to lung cancer in 2002. It took a team of specialists at Morristown Medical Center late last year to find that it was actually his heart – and two different heart conditions – causing his symptoms.

"He was short of breath and had no energy, and naturally thought this was all caused by having only one lung," says Philippe Généreux, MD, co-director of the Structural Heart Program at Morristown Medical Center. "In doing tests in preparation to treat one heart condition, arrhythmia (irregular heartbeat), we found another, severe mitral valve disease."

The mitral valve controls how blood travels through the heart to the rest of the body. Because of damage to Kevin's valve, his brain and muscles got only half the blood – and oxygen – they needed.

"That's what caused his fatigue," Dr. Généreux says. "Also, half the blood traveled backward, causing pressure in his chest and shortness of breath."

The procedure to repair his heart would be especially complicated, he says.

"Over the years, Kevin's heart had actually moved toward the area of the missing lung, which makes treatment even more difficult," Dr. Généreux says. "Without our combination of physicians, the chance of success for this procedure would be very low. But our team has the experience, and we knew we could do it."


Dr. Généreux repaired his valve with a small catheter, through his groin, avoiding open heart surgery. Other specialists at Morristown Medical Center then corrected his heart rhythm.

Today, Kevin is able to do more than ever before – including regular golf games and three-mile bike rides – plus visiting with his large family, including six children and nine grandchildren.

"I'm almost euphoric with how good it is to have a fully functioning heart for the first time in almost 20 years," he says. "I feel like I have part of a lung back, and I thank everyone at Morristown for that."

For people with advanced heart failure and pulmonary hypertension (high blood pressure in the lungs), a team of specialists with many different areas of expertise have designed Atlantic Health System's "Heart Success Program." It brings a high level of care to people across the region, at Atlantic Health System's Morristown, Overlook, Chilton, Newton and Hackettstown medical centers.

"We work closely with individual patients to provide the support and monitoring they need to keep them at their healthiest," says heart failure specialist Abhishek Singh, MD, PhD.

Dr. Singh has recently returned "home" to NJ as the medical director of the Heart Success program for Atlantic Health System.

"This team approach includes the patient, their loved ones and their cardiologist, along with the center's experts," Dr. Singh says. "Together, we offer each patient a treatment plan using the latest technology and research."

remember his words to date," says Keerti Sharma, MD, chief of geriatrics for Morristown Medical Center, speaking of one of her former patients. "He told me, 'I want someone to be the captain of my ship."

Iris Mednick, 72, of Somerset recalls that conversation, when her husband, Ron, first met Dr. Sharma and her team at the Geriatric Assessment Center at Morristown Medical Center, part of the David and Joan Powell Center for Healthy Aging.

The couple had realized in 2017 that Ron, with serious health issues, just had too many medical specialists to keep up with. They searched for a single, central provider, who could talk to each physician he saw, review each treatment and medicine he had, and let them know what services would help him with his health issues – and help Iris to continue to age well.

They found that kind of care at the Geriatric Assessment Center. The center brings together specialists in older adults (geriatrics), like Dr. Sharma, to help coordinate care among each patient's many different providers. Social workers, nurse practitioners and others also help them and their families identify care or support they might need -



from transportation to care at home and assistance with issues related to memory loss.

Dr. Sharma became a trusted ally and friend throughout Ron's life, and she continues to be important to Iris.

"Dr. Sharma even offered us encouragement by telephone just before Ron died peacefully at home in 2019," Iris says. "She and the whole staff have been so loving, warm and kind to me and my family. It's amazing care."

Surviving the Unsurvivable

Skydiver discharged from Morristown Medical Center nearly a year after a skydiving accident

 an Azeredo had strapped on a parachute and climbed into an airplane at Sussex County Airport hundreds of times.
 Skydiving was his passion and he and his wife Linda Farkas were regulars at the airstrip on weekends and holidays.

But on July 4, 2019, the 33-year-old Ringwood resident was on his own. After completing two jumps earlier in the day, lan and a group of friends got ready for the final skydive of the day.


When coming in to land after an otherwise good jump, something went horribly wrong, causing lan to crash to the ground at 60-70 mph. The impact immediately fractured his right femur, shattered his pelvic ring and caused significant internal bleeding and shock.

Aviation accidents are normally minor or fatal – rarely in between – but Ian defied the odds and survived. He spent close to a year at Morristown Medical Center and credits the team members for their outstanding care.

"I don't remember the impact or just before, but I remember being on the ground, being held still," Ian says. "I remember being loaded into the Medevac helicopter, departing for Morristown, and I remember the bright lights and voices around me as I was initially being worked on. Then, the next thing I knew, it was late August."

Many moments were erased from his memory. In addition, lan experienced a classic case of post-intensive care syndrome where he imagined he was in Air Force flight training using supplemental oxygen. After each "flight," he would remove his oxygen mask but, in reality, he was in the ICU tearing off his nasal tubes.

Kristin Ospina, RN, nursing director, Critical Care, explained that Ian was in a medically induced coma for a long time and needed countless procedures. "You don't often hear about skydiving accidents having a positive outcome," she



says. "The teams put their heart and soul into his care. His outcome is so rewarding."

Although lan's care team over the course of 300+ days in the hospital is too large to mention every name, his special thanks go to the teams in the Emergency Department, the ICU, the post ICU care team program, the entire team of trauma surgeons led by Louis DiFazio, MD, and the care team on Davino 1 and Deskovick 4. Volunteer Pete Martins, along with Louise Fordham Hale, lead patient care technician in the Emergency Department, whom Ian is now proud to call a "dear friend," helped inspire Ian to get through, as well as his wife, and parents who traveled from Massachusetts.

"I was given extremely good care – the caretakers and trauma team were all exemplary and fantastic people who deserve every ounce of credit they are due," Ian says. "An organization is only as good as its people, and Morristown Medical Center is a great example of that."

Ian is now back to work as chief engineer at Breeze-Eastern Corporation, an aerospace company in Whippany. He still has a few mobility issues but is slowly working through them in rehab and outpatient surgeries and says he plans to resist the temptation to skydive again.

New Infusion Center – Cancer Care Reimagined

rriving for his appointment at the new Infusion Center at Carol G. Simon Cancer Center in March 2020, donor, patient and former Atlantic Health System Trustee Bob Mulcahy could not believe his eyes. A spacious room, full of natural light, immediately put Mulcahy, a member of Carol G. Simon Cancer Center's Philanthropy Council at ease; and, to his delight, he was led to a private space to sit during infusions while still being able to see his care team.

"There was an air of calmness about the whole experience," Mulcahy says. A year ago, when he began receiving treatment, the Infusion Center was often more crowded and wait times for appointments were sometimes longer. The renovation and expansion changed all that.

From January through March of 2020, more than 4,500 patients visited the Infusion Center, up 15% from 2019. Twelve new infusion chairs are available for a total of 36, with both open and private setups, as some patients enjoy interaction while others prefer privacy. Lydia Nadeau, RN,

MBA, executive director; and Eric Whitman, MD, medical director of Atlantic Health System Cancer Care, met with health care team members and patient advisory groups for advice in the design process. Recliners for patients, a



comfortable chair for family members, iPads, blanket warmers and music, pet and art therapy were all non-negotiables and are reflected in the new design, promoting a healing experience and patient-centric care.

"We are creating a resource that will be treasured by the community for years to come," Dr. Whitman says.
